Widow's Might Ministry Directed by Mr. and Mrs. Wes Teterud

The Widow's Might ministry began informally with 22 widows gathering for their first meeting in the fall of 1998. The purpose of the Widows Might was to empower and equip widows to live alone again by providing a program and resources on issues related to widowhood.

Three out of every four married women in America will be widowed in their life time. The median age of a widow is 56 years old. The Widow's Might ministry is not a grief counseling ministry, but rather, a ministry that helps widows cope after they've gone through the grieving process. The ministry helps widows live alone again.

Widows throughout the Spokane area meet four times each year. The meetings are held at the Spokane Valley Nazarene Church on Sullivan. Research shows that Sunday afternoon is the loneliest day of the week for widows. Therefore the Widow's Might ministry meets on Sunday afternoon from 1-3 p.m.

The program consists of a nice lunch, special music and a featured speaker who addresses issues of widowhood. A chef from Spokane Community College spoke on the subject of cooking for one, a Deputy Sheriff addressed the subject of living alone safely, and another speaker warned the ladies about identity fraud.

The Widow's Might has grown from the initial 22 ladies eight years ago to well over 140 today. The next meeting is September 25th where Liberty Quartet from Boise, ID will be the featured program. There is no charge for the luncheon, but a free will offering is taken to help with expenses.

The mission of the Widow's Might Ministry is to fulfill James 1:27: "Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world."

This ministry is also one way we can encourage Pastors in smaller churches where it is sometimes difficult if not impossible to meet the needs of a widow. Be assured that your designated gifts to this ministry are shared personally and wisely. We are grateful to Wes and Adrienne for their faithful service.

On our return from the camp at Montana Wilderness School of the Bible, where I spoke on the theme of Creation and the overwhelming evidence of design in our world, we had another unexpected challenge. We left after the last evening service to make it home to spend a few extra days with our daughter and family visiting from Portland. They were able to stay a few extra days so we wanted to hurry home. It's about a 5 hour trip and we knew we would gain an extra hour on the way home with the time zone change, so we decided to leave at night instead of waiting until morning.

We took a back gravel road with a one-lane bridge that saved a few miles. Not long after driving over the bridge, we blew a front tire. Changing a tire involves emptying most of the equipment in the back of the van. I positioned the jack and began raising the van only to have the long crank/handle buckle in the middle making it useless. With the 90 degree temperatures, mosquitoes and equipment failure, a root canal may have been more fun.

I was able to use a vice-grip tool we had with us to hold the long jack crank together enough to just barely get the tire off the ground to change. We finely got back on the road. Needless to say, we lost the hour we had hoped to gain. We arrived at home about 2:00 a.m.

We are thankful that we were only traveling at about 30 mph and not yet on the highway. Things could have turned out very differently. I was also able to service the jack and repair the handle for the next time it is needed.

When I took the van in to check on a new tire, I learned it was just out of the road hazard warranty and of course we needed two new tires. That was an unexpected cost of about \$260. Along with recent maintenance expenses and the increase in fuel costs, there is a definite opportunity for some to assist in meeting these additional costs. He opened up a broken heart, led through dark valleys and used him for His own glory. I watched a week of ministry unfold and realized once again that God indeed called George to minister.
