Our newsletter is the most effective way I have of communicating with ministry friends. The following is what has happened in the past month.

Life can be filled with surprises, twists and turns, mountains and valleys. I often encourage my students at Valley Christian School to remember that every breath we take, and every beat of our hearts is a gift from God. Use those gifts wisely. I was reminded of that. On April 6<sup>th</sup> my daughter convinced me to go ER at Valley Hospital. I had been diagnosed with a viral infection, but symptoms were worsening into the third week. My daughter said that it appeared I had a kidney problem. I did have some twinges of pain on the right side in the kidney area, so I complied. She was correct. After a CT scan, it was determined that because of other complications, my kidneys were shutting down and I might have to go on dialysis. That got my attention. Interestingly, I also learned that both my kidneys are on the right side, so I would not have had any discomfort on the left side. That was verified by an ultrasound. I was in CCU at Valley Hospital for a week and then transferred to the Rehabilitation Hospital of the Northwest in Post Falls, ID.

I have been surprised by my weakness and limitations. For a few days in CCU, I could not lift my legs. I could do none of the simple human things of a daily routine. Learning to trust others is usually a challenge for all of us. I had no option. Simple willpower was not enough. I had to learn a new way of functioning. "Lord, what are You teaching me?" I was reminded of what Paul said about weakness in 2 Corinthians 12. "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." Therefore, I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may rest upon me. For the sake of Christ, then, I am content with weaknesses  $\dots$  For when I am weak, then I am strong." It is counterintuitive to be thankful for weaknesses and challenges. It is certainly true that when we are limited physically and lying in a hospital bed the only direction we can look is up.

James said, "Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds, for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness." Surely James is not going through a situation as difficult as mine. Then we learn that James and other early believers were going through life challenging situations with people who hated them enough to seek them out and kill them. When The word "count" in this context is an accounting term. It does not mean that we are to be thrilled that God has allowed problems in our lives. It means that we count the benefit of lessons God is teaching us. I have often said, "I don't need to experience that challenge. Just let me read about it in a book. I promise I will learn what You are teaching me." God says, "Yah, right. "But God, I learned that before." "Well, my child, you need a refresher course."

The Psalmist also reminds us in chapter 46 verse 10 to "Be still and know that I am God." That is a Hebrew expression to encourage us to simply "drop our arms," to guit trying to work things out on through our own energy, our own resources. This is especially difficult for men. We can fix the situation ourselves. As in previous newsletters, God at times does give us more than we can handle so we MUST depend on Him.

2 Corinthians 5 "For we know that if the tent that is our earthly home is destroyed, we have a building from God, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens . . . So we are always of good courage. We know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord, for we walk by faith, not by sight. . So whether we are at home or away, we make it our aim to please him."

I was able to give out 60 or more "Forgiven Witness" cards with the simple message that Christ died to make forgiveness possible. Hospital staff gladly took the cards and some even took an extra one two for others. Praying God uses the seed in hearts to bring some into Heaven.

I am uncertain of course when you will receive this newsletter. On May11<sup>th</sup> I have an appointment with a kidney specialist. So far, all testing has shown normal function. I have another appointment on May 19<sup>th</sup> that will determine the next step doctors will take. I have been assured that the probable procedure with take care of my problem. Pray with us to that end and thank you for your faithful encouragement.

## **Thoughts from Dawna . . .** Things Used To Be Harder

Yesterday I was reminiscing with one of my kids about what it was like growing up in a house that was built in the 1950's. According to modern aesthetics of the 1990's, when I was a teen living in that house with my parents, it might not have been considered desirable by most families. However, that house (where my dad still lives) was built to endure the decades with its heavy construction materials, thick walls, and solid floors.

My daughter, who is 15 years old, then also began to reminisce about what it was like for her spending most of her childhood up until now having lived in an older home. She said, "All the drawers in the kitchen and hallway were heavy and hard to pull out." \*She went on to say, "You know, I miss how that used to feel. Things are easier now, drawers in new homes are easy to open and close, but I miss that feeling of it being hard." \*

After she said this out loud to me, she apologized for possibly sounding weird or that it might not have made sense. I insisted otherwise and thanked her for sharing something that I regarded as profound due to the substance of what she was saying. The feeling of resistance and difficulty is a good thing and when you don't have hardship in your life, you're missing something essential.

As it relates to scripture, it made me think of **2 Corinthians 12:9-10.** <sup>9</sup> But he said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." Therefore, I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me.<sup>10</sup> That is why, for Christ's sake, I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties. For when I am weak, then



I am strong.

How does a heavy drawer that moves back and forth on wooden

slides remind me of Jesus? Because even a child recognizes that when adversity is gone, when hardship is gone, when you no longer need to exhibit strength because things are easier, you're missing out on something. Without weakness and persecutions, we don't need a Savior. It's tempting to wish that all those things in life that seem to bungle up progress, slow us down, make us angry, and are in the way of progress, end up being constant reminders that in our weakness God makes us strong. We are being built for eternity and finding closeness in a relationship with Jesus through the things that are hard, not through the progression of easiness and a simpler life.
